Culture Questions

Question: Why do people in America have to put gas (petrol) in their own cars?

Answer: Many years ago, there would always be someone working at a gas station whose job was to pump gas. This was called a 'full service' gas station. Not only would the person pump your gas, but they would often wash your windows and perhaps tell you if they noticed any problems with your car. Eventually, as more and more people had cars, gas stations would give you a choice between "full service" and "self service" (pumping your own gas). Gas stations would charge more money for full service. Since Americans don't like to pay extra money, they will most often choose to pump their own gas. These days, you will find a few full-service gas stations, but they are rare. However, if you drive across America, there are actually two states where it is illegal to pump your own gas. In both Oregon (Northwest US) and New Jersey (Northeast US), all of the gas stations are full service. If you try to pump your own gas in those states, you will be told to get back in your car!

Question: Why is it so hot in the building?

Answer: This is the case of many buildings at FSU. During the winter months, the heat will be turned on to try to keep the buildings warm in the morning when it is very cold outside. Since Florida is a sunny state, it usually heats up during the afternoon, but the heat is still on. You will sometimes find the buildings become very hot by the afternoon. We would advise you to wear layers in case you get too hot. Opening the windows can be a problem in some rooms because it lets in moisture from the outside. (Similarly, for those of you who study at FSU during the summer, the buildings are often very cold even though it is hot outside!)

Language Question

Question: What's the difference between using 'last year' and 'in the last year'?

Answer: Even though these two expressions are similar, they are used very differently.

"Last year" literally means the year before the present year. Since it is now 2016, the term last year is a synonym for 2015. Since 2015 is finished, we always use the simple past with 'last year'.

Examples: * He **visited** Germany last year.

* Last year, my family **built** a new house.

"In the last year" is an expression that means anytime from today until one year ago. We can also say "within the last year." We use present perfect with this expression.

Examples: * I **have been** to the movies twice in the last year.

* In the last year, my sister **has** probably **read** over 100 books!
