Culture Question

Question: Why is sales tax so high in the US?

Many students complain about having to pay sales tax on items. For example, if you get \$50 worth of food at a restaurant, you will actually end up paying \$54 (plus more money for a tip). However, tax rates in America are actually rather low. Many other countries in the world have much higher sales taxes, but the tax is already included in the price of the item. (This is usually called VAT or value added tax.) In America, the money paid for sales taxes goes to two places - the state government and the local government. (The national government does not get money from sales tax.) In Tallahassee, for example, the sales tax rate is 7.5%. 6% goes to the state of Florida, and 1.5% goes to the local government. Schools in Florida get a very large part of their money from sales tax! If you do not like paying sales tax,

you should be thankful. Even though Tallahassee's sales tax is more expensive than most other Florida cities, there are many places that are more expensive. The sales tax rate in many parts of Alabama and Tennessee is 10%! There is also a really high sales tax rate in cities like Seattle and Chicago (9.5%). If any of you are looking for a bargain, you can move to Oregon, Delaware, Alaska, Montana, or New Hampshire. You will save lots of money living there, but rest assured, the weather in Florida is much nicer than those places!

Language Question

Question: What is the difference between 'bring' and 'take'?

This is a common mistake. When using these verbs, a speaker needs to ask whether the object is being moved toward or away from the subject. If an object is being away from the subject, use 'take.' (You take things to a place that you are going.) If an object is being moved towards the subject, use 'bring.' (You have things brought to you.) For example, when your clothes are dirty, you will take the clothes to the dry cleaners. However, if you forget to turn in a major assignment, your teacher will remind you

to bring the assignment to him or her immediately. In the sentences below, choose either the verb 'bring' or 'take.'

- ¹It's raining outside! Let me <u>bring /</u> <u>take</u> you home.
- ²The jacket I bought is too big. I will have to <u>bring / take</u> it back to the store.
- ³My husband always <u>brings / takes</u> me flowers on my birthday.
- 4I left that great CD at home, but I'll be sure to <u>bring / take</u> it with me tomorrow and give it to you then.

Answers: take for #1 and #2; bring for #3 and #4
