Culture Questions

Question: Why is sweet tea so popular at restaurants?

Answer: For those of you who have visited any restaurant in Tallahassee, you've probably noticed that one of the most popular beverages is sweetened iced tea. Iced tea is fairly common in many parts of the United States, but sweetened iced tea is generally only found in the southern states. Amongst Southerners (such as your Nole News editor), it is the most popular beverage with meals.

Outside of the South, some people find sweet tea to taste too sweet. Tea was originally brought to America by the British hundreds of years ago. In the 1800's, iced



tea started being served (likely as a cool treat in hot climates). The popularity grew, especially in the South, and most Southerners found it easier to sweeten the tea before

adding ice. Since sugar doesn't dissolve as easily in cold water, people choose to sweeten their tea while it is still hot and before cooling it.

If you haven't tried real sweet tea (not the bottled kind), you should definitely do it before leaving Tallahassee! It can be found at almost every restaurant. And, if you find it too sweet, you may want to mix it with unsweetened tea. It is the perfect summertime beverage.

Language Question

Question: If I have two words connected by the word 'or' in the subject of my sentence, is the verb singular or plural?

Answer: This is an important grammar question. Let's look at the sentence below using 'and'.

Juan and Ahmed play Frishee in the park every weekend.

In this sentence, even though 'Juan' and 'Ahmed' are both singular, the use of 'and' makes the subject plural. Any time there is a compound subject using and, the verb is always plural.

However, with 'or' it is a little bit different. If both parts of the complex subject are singular, then the verb is also singular.

My brother or best friend picks me up on Wednesday afternoons. (Both words are singular, so we have a singular verb 'picks')

If both parts of the compound subject are plural, then we use a plural verb.

My cousins or my friends always help me when I have trouble. (Both words are plural, so we have a plural verb 'help')

If one part of the compound subject is singular and one part is plural, then the verb agrees with whichever subject is closer.

The twins or Johnny was guilty. (The verb agrees with 'Johnny.') *Johnny or the twins were guilty*. (The verb agrees with 'twins.')

If these rules confuse you, then simply avoid having a complex subject with 'or' and then you hopefully won't make any errors. ©
